Northern Horizon's started as an idea back in the fall of 2002 to showcase the enthusiasm and abilities of Manitoba lily growers to the world. By the spring of 2003, Susan LeBlanc and I had been appointed co-chairs and a venue had been secured. 14 subcommittees were established to run all aspects of the show and the work started.

Let me fast forward to 2005. The committees that were established did great work in the months leading up to the final event. They took charge and responsibility for their duties and did a fantastic job. Let me quote from a note that I received from Dr. Gene Fox the outgoing Canadian president: "What a superlative show and meeting you people staged. We enjoyed every aspect from our tour guide, food, hotel, the tours, the seminars, the huge show and the banquets were simply terrific. Thanks so much to you and your whole team."

# Northern Horizons - 2005

The 58th annual North American Lily Society conference and show has gone down in the history books and is now a memory. After three years of putting our hearts and souls into this event, the Manitoba Regional Lily Society has shown once again that (as our President might say) "MRLS Rocks".

Not only was this show one of the biggest seen in recent memory, it was also one of the best according to the reports we have received from many of the 156 registrants and guests, many of whom came a long way to participate. Held at the Canad Inn Polo Park from 13 to 17 July, the MRLS showed lily lovers and their guests that even in our severe temperate climate and despite snow, frost, wind, water and everything in between, we can grow great lilies rivaling the lily world's best.

We were off to a great start on the first evening with a welcome reception where weary and not so weary registrants gathered for some good conversation, a quick bite to eat and a glass of wine. At times it was shoulder to shoulder but it never seemed crowded. New people were met, old friendships were rekindled and the lily chatter was very refreshing. It was a fine way to start off. Len and Rita Giesbrecht are to be commended for handling everything related to hospitality and liaison with the hotel staff. The decision to have a specific room designated for hospitality for the entire event was inspired and people commented time after time that it was wonderful to have a place they could just get away to and enjoy a coffee or juice in relative quiet. They were also in charge of making sure everyone got what they ordered at the various meals and banquets and pulled it off with the assurance of professionals. I think the hotel was ready to hire Rita by the end of the last day!

Sandra Venton and Marlene Puls were in charge of the registration desk and each and every registrant received their package and a warm greeting on arrival.

Set up for the show and the first round of speakers highlighted the first full day of conference activities. First among the four international speakers was Norgarte Marschinki from Germany. Her presentation outlining her work with the North American species and her hybridizing program was given with energy and enthusiasm. And the slides were just breathtaking.

Next up was Jaap VanTuyt from the Netherlands. Dr. VanTuyt's presentation concentrated on his work in the commercial flower industry and the scientific applications to liliium hybridization. Again, the photos were magnificent and elicited audible expressions of distinct approval.

But, the show set up area presided over by John and Joan Svenson was THE hub of activity for the exhibitors. It was not unusual to see pails of lilies outside the back doors of the hotel with some very ingenious ways employed to try and get blooms to open in time. Everything from warm water, a hot car interior and hair dryers came into play. In fact, the set up area was the place to be most of the day and on into the very early morning on Friday. Barrie and Nigel Strohman in classification did not get much sleep that night as MRLS members and the general public answered the call to enter lily stems and designs. By the time it was all said and done with the show area being reworked numerous times to accommodate each and every entry, there were a total of 725 stems, 33 floral displays and a number of potted lily specimens. In addition, there were 61 entries for the first ever NALS photo contest supervised by Frans Officer. With this success the photo contest should now become a regular part of the annual shows.

The show tables sported lilies from a total of 66 exhibitors from Alberta, Saskatchewan, Ontario, the United States and, of course, Manitoba. A significant number of the exhibitors were 'first timers' who had never shown before. Many took home 1st, 2nd, 3rd or Honorable Mention ribbons and I do hope we see them back at future MRLS shows.

Once you get your first ribbon or cut your first lily, it can become addictive. The first

time cutting a stem it was very hard to do but once it is done it is a lot easier the next time, and the time after that. And showing your lilies that you grew yourself and to receive recognition for that is like nothing else. As one first timer indicated to me, "Okay, you got me....I'm hooked".

The total number of entries was down from the 1,000 stems John Rempel talked about wanting for this show, but I honestly don't know what we would have done if that many stems actually showed up. There was not a single foot of extra space anywhere on the show room floor or tables.

But, it was walking into the show room with all those lilies that really was the defining moment of the entire event for me. Jennifer Bishop instructed me to close my eyes as she opened the doors and led me inside. When my eyes opened to see that many lily stems and arrangements, I can truly say that it was totally awesome; a sea of color from every side with lilies of every size, shape, color and description. It was THE moment for me and one I will not soon forget even though I really didn't get all that much time to enjoy it.

A bison roast dinner and tour of the Assiniboine Park Conservatory and the Leo Mol Sculpture Garden capped off a very full day. Thank goodness the mosquito spray was on board the busses or I swear they would have carried off some of the participants. I can't remember another year with so many of what is becoming known as our provincial insect!

On Friday it was the judging of the show entries that took place in the morning. For the first time in several years the MRLS award for a collection of 12 different lilies was won. In fact, it was the first time in years there were even entries in this class. Brian Bergman of Ontario took the prize (a lovely crystal lily piece) but he was closely followed by our own John Rempel in second place and the team of Terry Willoughby and Shauna Cannon from Alberta in third place.

Being a relatively novice show judge, it never ceases to amaze me the amount of lily knowledge that is possessed by the more senior judges. I learned the difference between

weather damage and fasciation, how to spot lilies that have been in cold storage prior to exhibition as well as some of the creative ways exhibitors use to try to cover up flaws in their lily stems in the hope that the judges do not notice. It took nine teams of four judges and two clerks each every minute allotted that morning to judge the stems and determine the award winners. A monumental task ably overseen by Wilbert Ronald on the judges side and Susan LeBlanc on the clerks side.

Then it was off to seminar number three and Antra Balode from Latvia. Ms. Balode spoke about the efforts of the lily hybridizers in her country and showed some wonderful results of their work. Again the ooh's and aaaaah's of the attendees was audibly apparent.

The last but by no means least seminar was conducted by David Sims of Idaho on his ground breaking work with the Martasians, crosses between martagon lilies and asiatic lilies. All I can say about that is WOW! I'll be watching closely for these lilies to hit the market in the not too distant future (I hope).

Friday night was capped off by the Research Auction where I'm told close to \$6,000 in Canadian funds was raised for research projects related to the genus *lilium*. Presided over by Ed Soboczenski from Delaware, the live auctioneer was Dean Hartle of Minnesota, ably assisted by Ede Strand of Wisconsin. A number of choice lily bulbs found new homes as well as some lovely donated items. On the silent auction side, hot items included test tubes of embryo rescued bulblets from the US and the Netherlands, and various exotic lily bulbs, lily related books and other gift items.

Saturday was the big day for tours. The weather was perfect and two Beaver busses and a van headed off for a full day in rural southern Manitoba. Bus captains Ed Czarnecki and John Rempel provided descriptive commentary about the areas traveled through and provided handouts for everyone.

The first stop was Jeffries Nurseries in Portage la Prairie where the Ronald's entertained everyone before a side trip to the grow-

ing fields. The highlight of this leg of the journey was the 'singing gardener' with songs specifically about lilies and the hospitality of the entire Ronald family who made it a visit to remember.

Then it was on to Neepawa where representatives of the Lily Festival committee boarded the busses for a quick tour of the town site before heading off to the main event of the tour, The Lily Nook, located just 5 miles outside Neepawa. The Strohman family was there to greet the tour busses and served a very tasty organic lunch under a large tent. Barrie was actually wearing his straw hat and got right in there serving food, chatting with all the hungry lily folk and generally treating them to a great time they will remember. Of course, then the sky opened up and a thunderstorm threatened to cut short the time at the Nook growing fields. But, in true prairie style, the hardy lily lovers roamed the growing fields in the rain and after a few short minutes the rain stopped. The amazing thing was that there was no mud; just wet sand that was not hard to walk on so the final stop of the tour was saved. There was too little time to look at everything but what was seen was appreciated. Then it was back on the busses and back to Winnipeg for the Awards Banquet. It was a subdued crowd that alighted back at the Canad Inn in time to freshen up and change clothes for the banquet following.

The Awards Banquet was the final official function of the conference. Dr. Wilbert Ronald gave the keynote speech after which he was presented with a crystal piece engraved with a likeness of 'Starburst Sensation' on it by Jennifer Bishop, president of the MRLS on behalf of the membership for all of his contributions over the years to the society and to the members of the society. What made the evening even more special was that Dr. Ronald was announced as the 2005 winner of the E. H. Wilson Award, the most prestigious award given by the North American Lily Society for outstanding contribution to the NALS and to the genus *lilium*. The announcement was a surprise to everyone in attendance. We were all pleased to see that his family was there, too, to see him presented with the award. Initially he had no idea they were waiting outside the banquet hall for the an-

nouncement to be made. That was the highlight of the evening.

During the banquet, as only the prairies can, a severe thunderstorm rumbled through the city flooding roads, downing power lines, submerging gardens and putting on one heck of a light show.

But as Kathy Anderson from Delaware was heard to say "I didn't come all this way to be stopped by a little rain!". And so, many gardens that were still accepting visitors despite the weather enjoyed having people drop by to visit and chat despite the soggy state and cloudy skies.

And that my friends, is the story of Northern Horizons 2005. We showed the North American lily community as well as our guests from Europe and the US that Canadians are in the forefront of growing lilies despite the challenges we face. We served notice that the MRLS was a force of nature in itself and that MRLS really and truly does ROCK! And, we showed everyone what the dedication of volunteers and friends can accomplish and for that I would like to thank you one and all for helping to make it happen.

### Question & Answer

**Q:** I am planning on moving this winter and have a lot of lilies I do not want to leave behind. How can I take these with me?

**A:** Lilies can be dug and moved most any time but the best time to move lilies is in the fall when they are shutting down for the winter. At this time they can be dug and put in pots and then stored in a cold but not freezing place and then grown on next year or the bulbs can be put into plastic bags in vermiculite or peat moss and stored in the crisper of the fridge at 1 or 2 degrees Celsius and then planted out next spring. The latter is probably the most feasible for you.

## Dr. Wilbert Ronald receives E.H. Wilson Award

Let me introduce you to the person who is this year's recipient of the most prestigious award given by the North American Lily Society, a man whose achievements in the advancement of the genus *Lilium* are as follows;

He pioneered the breeding of OT's (orienpets) in Canada with several cultivars now being listed in the members popularity poll i.e. 'Northern Sensation', 'Starburst Sensation', 'Northern Carillon' and 'Northern Beauty'. One cultivar 'Northern Carillon' has been relegated to the lily hall of fame which is a fine recommendation for the few short years that it has had in commercial availability.

He was instrumental in having his breeding work in lilies and the further work of Lynn Collicutt in lilies released, tested, named, and put into commercial trade from the Morden Research Station. He was, with the collaboration of Lynn, in the forefront of Asiatic breeding in Canada with several cultivars named and released i.e. 'Firey Belles', 'Creamy Belles', 'Purple Belles', 'Silky Belles', 'Ivory Belles', and 'Blushing Belles'.

His breeding work in the longiflorum and trumpets carried on by Lynn gave us 'Easter Dawn', 'Easter Morn' and now the newly released 'Easter Charm' with further ones to be introduced and released. The multitude of his work because of the hardiness, disease resistance, and growability has expanded the areas where lilies can be grown and enjoyed especially here in the north but also in the southern climes. He indeed has expanded the Northern Horizons.

Because of his work and his continued breeding work with lilies we now have oriental type blooms here on the prairies. For these reasons and due to his continued dedication to the advancement of lily breeding, E.H Wilson award goes to a special man and a special friend, Dr. Wilbert Ronald.

## BULB SALE NOTICE

It is Bulb Sale time! The Bulb Sale Committee has been hard at work finding sources of new and interesting bulbs for your lily patch. This year we are featuring a newly released lily called 'Dark Moon'. It is a tall, strong, 1b, black/red lily that will be offered for the first time ever to you. 'Dark Moon' was shown at the NALS 2005 Show and is a must have for the lily patch. There will also be Tango hybrids offered for the first time. These are the cutting edge in asiatic lily breeding and are sought after by collectors, hybridizers and lily growers everywhere.

The mail order section has been expanded to include a larger selection. The 10% member discount will again be in effect. Your membership must be paid up and you must get your order in accompanied by your payment before September 25<sup>th</sup> to participate via mail order. The list and order form is included with this publication.

There will again be a limited number of named martagons available both through mail order and at the sale locations. Martagons are not just beautiful to look at but they also extend the lily bloom season by providing early bloom in the garden. To help extend the bloom time late in the lily season, we are offering named orienpets such as 'Northern Beauty', 'Northern Carillon', 'Starburst Sensation' and other Morden Research Station stock. The committee has also found a source for mixed orienpet bulbs in many colors that we are able to offer at just \$6.00. These will be of interest to lily growers who want to try growing the OT's and don't care what they are called, as well as seasoned lily growers who want to expand their OT patch at a very reason-

able cost. Hardy Manitoba hybridized asiapets such as 'Firey Belles', 'Ivory Belles' and 'Creamy Belles' will also be available. These bloom after the LA's and provide a very nice show while you wait for the orienpets. A special purchase on 'Firey Belles' has been negotiated and so we are able to make it available at the never before offered price of just \$6.00 each. They won't last long at that price! The other asiapets will be selling for \$9.00 each. The entire 'Belles Series' is a definite must have for every lily gardener.

Bulk bulbs will be offered at all sale locations. These bulbs are good garden lilies whose names have been lost and so can't be sold as named varieties. These are just \$1.00 each. There will also be a named bulk bulb, 'Lavender Ballerina', that for this one time only will be sold for just \$3.00. Because the bulk area has become a popular destination, it has been expanded this year to include an unnamed trumpet variety for \$4.00.

Many more varieties will be offered at the sale locations than on the mail order list so do try to make it out to one of the sale locations. But, if there is no location near you or there is no one you can have shop for you, please take advantage of the expanded mail order service.

See you in Winnipeg October 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> at Assiniboine Park Conservatory, Brandon on October 1<sup>st</sup> at the Town Centre and in Dauphin on October 8<sup>th</sup> at the Marketplace Mall.
