MANITOBA HERITAGE LILY CONSERVATION PROJECT

Report Feb. 8/07

Problem:

MRLS is concerned about the loss or potential loss of genetic material, in genus 'lilium', developed by Manitoba hybridizers.

Name of lilies: Heritage Lilies

Identify material: Any Manitoba Hybridized Registered lily.

Manitoba Hybridizers:

Aim of the Project:

- We want to preserve Manitoba Hybridized Registered Heritage lilies (over 200 varieties).
- Even now many heritage lilies are little known because few lily suppliers propagate these exquisite gems.
- This will also allow MRLS to recognize and honor Manitoba lily hybridizers.

Method:

- make a list of Manitoba hybridized registered lilies
- locate suitable lily garden sites to grow heritage lilies as they become available.
- plan for three sites.
- consider hardiness zone, soil type, rainfall and irrigation availability, accessibility and visibility for the public.
- plan for care and maintenance needs i.e. cultivation, disease and insect control, fertilizing and watering.
- consider cost of operation including rental of land, maintenance, purchase of bulbs, name markers, recording and PR costs such as signage.
- develop a contract with the land owner.

How to find and track heritage lilies:

- provide a list of Manitoba Hybridized Registered lilies to all MRLS members, a list will be printed in the MRLS newsletter.
- members will be asked to assist in locating and/or gathering these lilies.
- lists to be made available at shows and educational meetings and to other societies.
- gathered information will be documented and updated as it becomes available.
- forms will be made to gather data i.e. lily name; owners name, address and phone number.

Statistics:

Records will be kept as to names of hybrids and dates received, plus names of donors.

The number of bulbs at each garden site will be documented, plus extras and where they were distributed.

Goals:

1. develop one heritage lily garden site and working plan within one year.
2. in the future, two additional garden sites will be developed as bulbs and sites become available with a goal of three sites in total.
3. bulbs will be the property of MRLS.
4. contract to be developed with land owner, to include care and maintenance provided by the landlord (siteowner) Expenses (including rent) incurred to be paid by MRLS.
5. MRLS to provide volunteers as needed.
6. bulbs may be purchased by MRLS.
7. excess bulbs (over 12 at each site) may be sold. It is hoped that funds from the sale of excess bulbs will help cover expenses.
8. consideration to be given for the availability of pollen to other hybridizers.

**Heritage Lily Conservation Project
Late Ed Robinson of Wawanesa, MB**

Ed Robinson originally started a nursery near the shores of Lake Winnipegosis in the 1930's. Later he moved to Wawanesa and established Gaybird Nursery where he sold trees shrubs and perennials. It was here that his interest in lilies grew to the point that he hybridized and registered 128 varieties of Asiatics. His most substantial work with lilies came with the cross he made between L. tsingtauense and known martagon hybrids His martagon registrants number over 30. These have proved to be the best of all the crosses made so far by others who made this same cross. MRLS TRIBUTE TO GENE FOX

I was introduced to Gene Fox and martagon lilies on the same day, a very hot July afternoon at the 1995 NALS Show in Edmonton, Alberta. I fell in love with the martagons instantly, but I wasn't terribly sure about Gene. He had wonderful clumps of martagons all over his property in Millet, Alberta, and I remember tripping over people trying to get a look at "just one more over there". Gene was slightly forbidding, probably due to the fact that hordes of people were tramping all over the place, and I am sure he was wincing inside each time someone trod too closely to any of the stems. There had to be other lilies there, but it was the martagons that held my focus.

And over the years, as I went to more NALS shows to judge, and then to Edmonton specifically to judge the martagon show, Gene became less distant. When I was asked to run for election as a director of NALS, Gene encouraged me, and when I was asked to take over as Recording Secretary of NALS, Gene gave me the final "push", as I was quite undecided.

Gene was passionate about lilies in general, but obsessed with martagons in particular, and it was the martagons that finally drew us together. Over the years at the various shows and meetings, we would seek each other out to discuss, compare, and judge the martagons which were entered in the shows. Because most of the shows in the north were later in July to enable all exhibitors to show their asiatics, trumpets, orientpets and others, the martagons usually got short shrift at the NALS shows.

I then discovered that the Alberta Regional Lily Society held an annual martagon show, and that did it for me. Each summer, for at least the past 4 years or so, I would go to Edmonton specifically to judge the martagon show, but also to visit with friends, shop at Hole's Nursery and see Marv Joslin and go through his fields evaluating martagons. When Gene found out that I was in Edmonton to judge the martagons, he invited me to visit him and go through his fields. And my collection of martagon cultivars grew and grew, and finally I gained enough of Gene's trust that he would provide me with his own martagons. You see, Gene was very fussy about selling his martagon bulbs, and, if I remember correctly, he would send the bulbs, together with a "Contract" that made the purchaser promise faithfully to look after the martagons! It was probably at that time that Gene and I started to correspond by e-mail, not only about martagons, but about life in general, random thoughts and pet peeves. For some reason I saved each e-mail, and I sometimes sit down and re-read them, laugh at some of his outrageous comments, and shed a tear for a lost friend.

Marv Joslin passed away just before the New Year, and I remember that Gene wrote to say that he and Gail had attended Marv's funeral, "to see old Marv off", and how touched he was at all the people who attended. Little did anyone realize that Gene would follow Marv two weeks later. The NALS Midwinter Meeting was about a week after that, and everyone there was in a state of shock at Gene's sudden passing. Although we knew that he wasn't in the best of health, none of us realized that he would be taken from us so quickly. I had so looked forward to seeing Gene at the Midwinter Meeting, and the thought that I would never see him again was hard to bear. I think that we were all in a state of mourning that weekend.

Gene was a friend, mentor, fellow martagon enthusiast and a person dear to me. I shall miss his friendship and the fact that I won't have the benefit of his knowledge, or have the ability to "pick his brain". His book on martagons sits on my living-room coffee table, and I frequently pick it up just to make sure that I'm not doing anything incorrectly, or have forgotten anything important.

I was very lucky to have visited Gene and Gail at the Fox Lily Ranch last July, and even luckier to have obtained several more of his named cultivars and seedlings, as well as some species that I had been dreaming about for years. I hope that Gene's newest creations become readily available and that all of his hard work hasn't been done in vain. And, I shall think of Gene every time I walk through my garden to see the martagons bloom.

You are invited to enroll in a judging school sponsored by the Manitoba Lily Society

The MRLS will be offering (if enough interest is shown) a Judging School. For further info and to sign up please contact Barrie Strohman at 204-476-3225

Reasons to enroll in a judging school:

It is the first step in becoming an accredited N.A.L.S. lily judge. This enables you to serve your regional societies and the N.A.L.S. in an important role. The course benefits you in your ability to show prize winning stems, i.e. the selecting of a stem that has the most opportunity to win, the grooming, the transportation and the do's and don'ts in showing. The course adds to your knowledge in growing your favorite flower, the lily, to perfection and in the culture and understanding of its needs. As a hybridizer, the course enables you to evaluate your seedlings as to what makes an outstanding plant. It helps you to select which parents to use in your breeding work to achieve your goal.

One of the reasons or perhaps all of the above reasons are incentives to attend a judging school and will give you a higher sense of achievement in knowing and understanding the genus liliium.
